## An age-old game

The simple yet strategic game of **noughts and crosses**, also known as **tic-tac-toe**, has been around to fill periods of boredom for longer than you may think. It was played over 2,000 years ago in the Roman Empire where it was called **terni lapilli**. Players just had three stones which they moved around a grid. However, the game may date back even further as there is evidence that the ancient Egyptians played some form of it.

Experts believe the name **ticktack** or **tic-tac-toe** came about sometime in the 1800s when the game was played by blindly throwing a pencil at a slate. Historians believe the name derived from the sound the pencil made when it hit the slate.


This classic game has survived the test of time though and in 1952 it was the first game to be played on a computer. So next time you draw yourself a grid, you can thank the ancient Egyptians for easing your boredom.
